## Programme Outcomes of BSW LLB (Hons.) Degree Programme

Law Graduates acquiring BSW LLB (Hons.) Degree from GNLU will be able to:

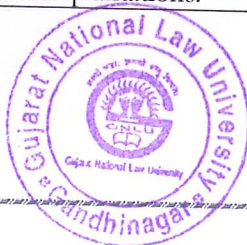

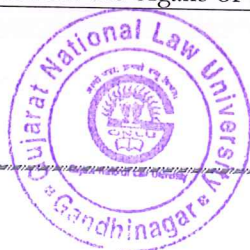
